Welcoming remarks by Miss Sarah Wu, Director-General Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office, London

It will provide all-round support to the local film industry, including training and overseas promotion,

and we have expanded its scope to finance the production of small-to-medium budget films.

Hong Kong continues to thrive as Asia's world city, a centre for financial and professional services, trade, shipping and tourism. 'One Country, Two Systems' also meant that Hong Kong has been able to maintain its lifestyle and continues to enjoy prosperity and stability. As a cosmopolitan city where east meets west, Hong Kong has been the place for talented people to unleash their creativity and pursue their dreams.

Finally I hope you will enjoy this film season, and that you enjoy this evening's film 'Ashes of Time: Redux.' Again I would like to congratulate the Arsenals Team for putting all this together, and thank you for inviting me here to speak.
